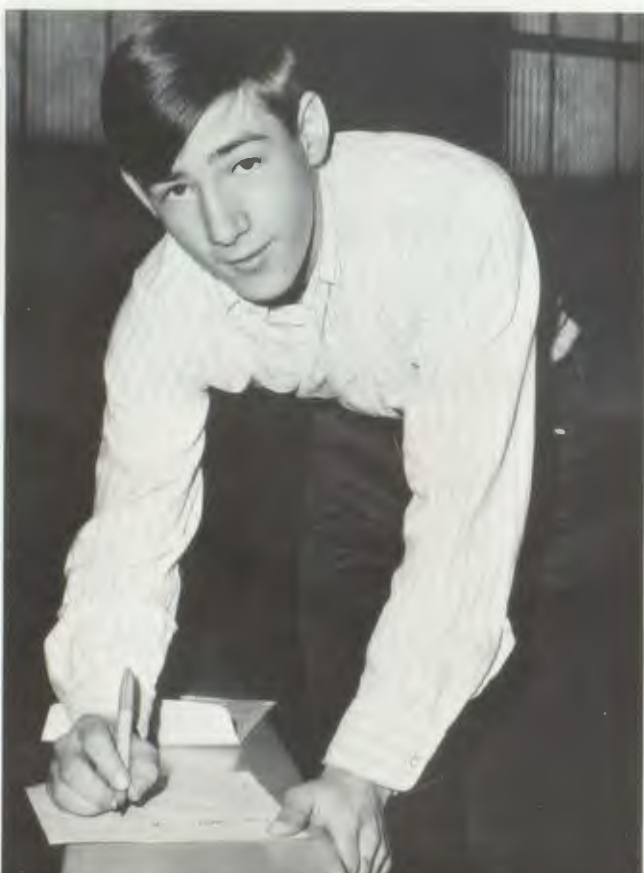

Search In The First Year Of The Seventies

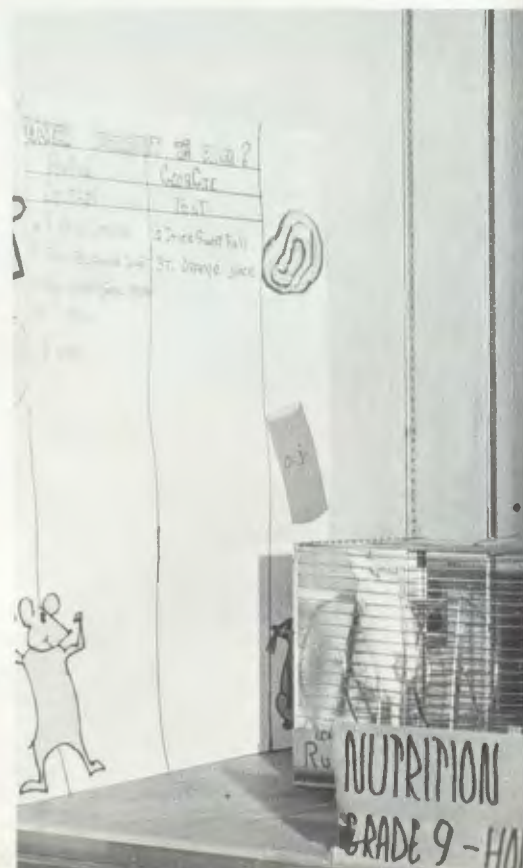

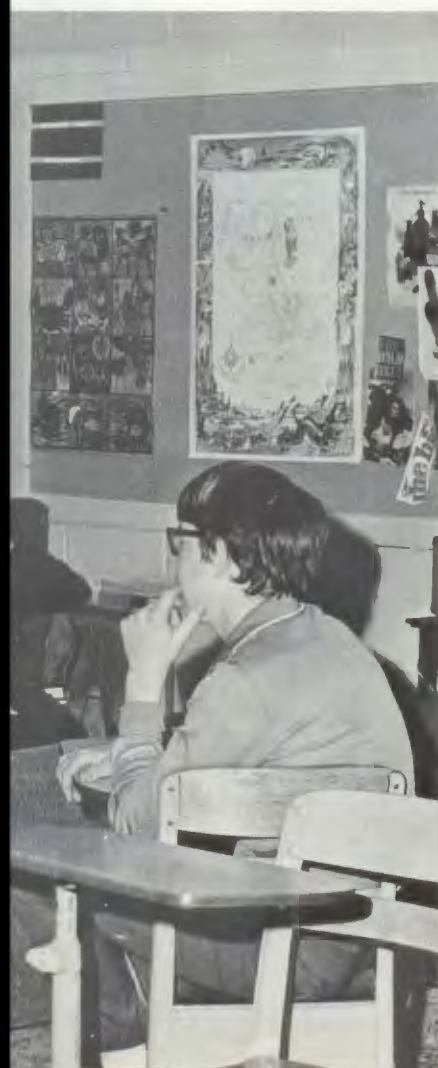

For many students, English had become that which is given by the teacher and written down verbatim in notebooks. It was then given back to the teacher and just as completely forgotten.

The students can learn from each other as well as from the teacher. In this kind of atmosphere a sharing of views occurs.

In addition to the required work, students are given the opportunity to choose from a vast variety of topics, all related to communication.

The volume of scientific information is expanding at a fantastic rate. It is the intention of the Science Department to help students develop a system of acquisition, integration and continuing understanding of this information and its effects on their lives.

Here at Vergennes, we are currently using new teaching approaches in Biology, Physics, Chemistry and Physiology. We are also experimenting with our own approach to an introduction to these programs with a special ninth grade course. All science classes are attempting to emphasize the laboratory approach to learning concepts.

Students Learn From Each Other As Well As The Teacher

At VUHS, there has not been the activity for change in mathematics which has been taking place in method and content of English and Social Studies and to a degree, in the Sciences. This situation exists because the "new math" has been with us for a few years. Although the change in math has been more in content than in method, we are going through a period of consolidation.

Our aim is to give a student as much mathematics as he needs or wants, without discouraging him. Those students showing ability and interest are encouraged to pursue the entire five year sequence.

Social Studies Teach Responsibilities Of Citizenship

The principal aim of the Social Studies Department is to develop, in the student, the ability to form a worthwhile opinion, and thereby to become a responsible citizen.

Memorization for the sake of memorization plays a small part in this department's approach to learning. An understanding of the events and the conditions which produced the American Revolution, the War of 1812, the First and Second World Wars and the War in Vietnam is more important than the dates of the War. Through case studies, students are encouraged and stimulated to analyze both sides of the question. Student-teacher debates arouse even more enthusiasm and point the way to a careful evaluation. Movies and film strips make the events of past history and those of the present day real and vivid.

Although the emphasis is placed on life today and the projections of the future, our understanding is based on the knowledge passed on to us from the past.

If we, as students, are informed in these areas, we will, upon graduation, be better equipped to assume the responsibilities and the challenge of being a better citizen. Upon us will fall the search for a new and more exciting world.

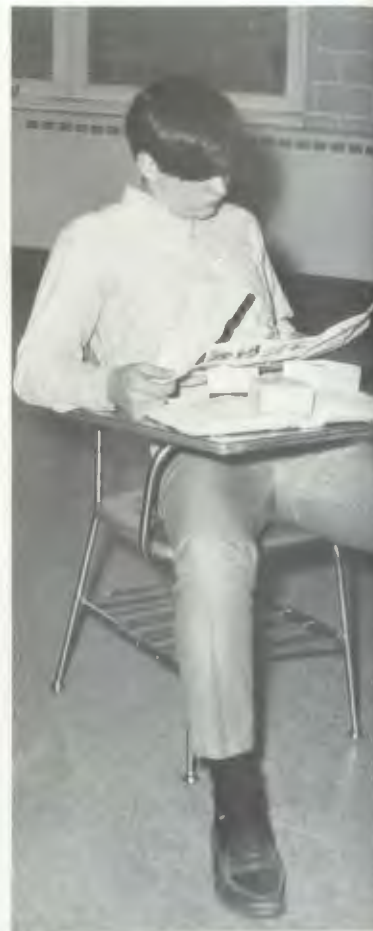

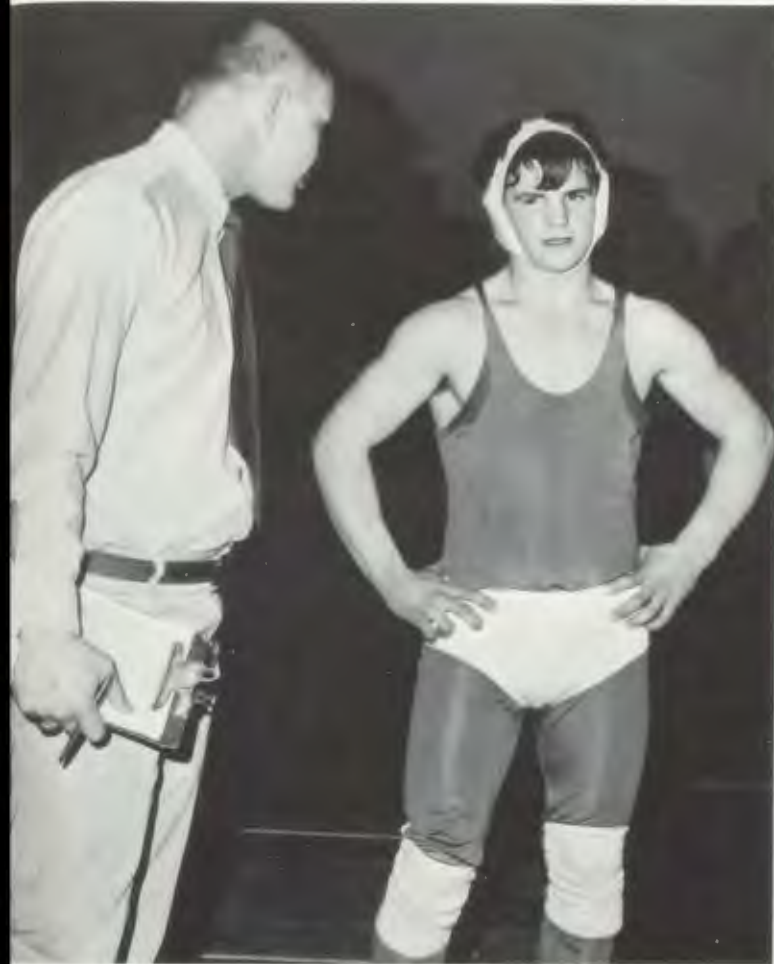

Wrestlers' Season A Huge Success

With the addition of wrestling to the VUHS Winter Sports Program, a new and tremendously exciting dimension in school spirit was developed. Coach Chip Wolcott depended heavily on returning members from his club activity last year, and was able to form a consistently strong team in twelve weight classes. Thirty seven boys added great depth to both varsity and J.V. teams. Bill Scott, in his debut as a wrestling coach, did a fine job with his J.V. team, and helped to develop many potential champions for varsity competition.

Tri-Captains Mike DuBois, Robin Jackman, and Dan Bill accumulated a total of 30 wins, while only losing 4 all season. In thirteen dual-meets, and a Holiday Tournament, the Commodores earned a cumulative record of 106 individual victories (including 73 pins, 27 decisions and 6 by forfeit). In total matches the following were recorded: 127 fakedowns, 64 escapes, 61 reversals, 41 predicaments, and 40 near falls. The team ended its dual-meet season with eight wins and five losses, placed fourth in the Green Mountain Wrestling League, and took third out of an eleven-field Christmas Tournament. They were fourth in the first State Schoolboy Wrestling Championships.
