





Administration

Changes are coming in the Math Department

With the arrival of a new Math Department Chairman, Mr. Barlow, numerous changes are in the making for V.A.U.H.S.

Individualization is the goal in the Math Department. Through the use of a Continuous Progress Group, to be introduced over the next two years, math students will work on their own level, regardless of grade or subject sequence. Math students in the Continuous Progress Group will be somewhat self-motivated. This is an idea previously applied only to English and the Social Studies — never to Mathematics. Self-motivation includes the use of students as teachers in the Elementary School.

A new course being designed, Life Service Math, is meant to prepare the average student for the everyday problems such as income taxes, business loans, and ordering from catalogues.

Science Department introduces curriculum changes

All seventh, eighth, and ninth grade students have required introductory Physical Science courses. In the future the remaining three years will be divided into six semesters. Half year courses will allow variations and flexibility. A nursing student, for instance, will be able to take three semesters each of Chemistry and Biology. Each semester will concentrate on a specific area. Instead of General Physics, a science student will have a choice of concept units, such as Electricity and Magnetism, Atomic Theory or Relativity. This program will allow the student to select those subjects most suited to his needs.

New vocational school changes programs at V.U.H.S.

Sixty-six students travel by bus each day to the newly opened Vocational School in Middlebury which serves the Vergennes-Bristol-Middlebury area. They are enrolled in a wide variety of courses such as Business, Agriculture, Drafting and Auto-Mechanics. After lunch these students return to Vergennes to complete their program in the academic area. As a consequence the vocational offerings at V.U.H.S. have become largely Freshman and Sophomore courses. These courses are designed to prepare the student to enter into the program in the Central Vocational School. The Home Economics Department does continue to offer a four year sequential program designed to respond to the individual interests of the students.


Business — Vocations






